Parent-Teacher Conference Update

Thank you for attending Parent-Teacher Conferences which were held on February 7th, 12th, and 13th. Although Parent-Teacher Conferences are not the only means of increasing communication between teachers and parents, it is still one of the most effective. If you were unable to make it to your scheduled conference, please call Horizon Middle School at 698-8120 and make arrangements to visit with your child's teachers. We highly encourage communication between school and home so parents are up to date with their children's progress. You may call the school and set up a conference anytime you feel you would like to get more information. Another tool available for your use is Infinite Campus. If you have received your activation code for Infinite Campus, you have been able to set up a username and password to access grade information as often as you like. Grades are entered on a weekly basis, so you will have access to recent grades. If you have set up your account with Infinite Campus, and you are having problems, please send an e-mail to ichelp@kearneycats.com.

Once again, please feel free to contact the school to visit with any of your child's teachers if you have any questions or concerns. It is much better to be proactive than to wait until it is too late.

Testing/Assessment Sessions

As we begin the second semester at Horizon Middle School, we know there are several testing / assessment sessions coming up for your son or daughter. The Nebraska Department of Education has constructed assessments that are administered across the state called the NSCAS- **Nebraska Student-Centered Assessment System**. Students are assessed in mathematics and reading in grades 6-8. Eighth grade students are also assessed in science.

The NSCAS assessments in math, reading, and 8th grade science, are scheduled to start the first week in April. Here is the testing schedule as we have it so you can write this information on your calendar:

Math - 90 minutes suggested testing time (48 questions)

Math Session 1: Tuesday, April 16, 8:35 - 9:35 (60 minutes)

Math Session 2: Thursday, April 17, 8:35 - 9:35 (60 minutes)

Math Make-up testing: April 18

*****Make Up Tests all Due by April 26*****

Following the Nebraska State Assessments, Kearney Public Schools will begin the final segment of standardized testing which you know as MAP or Measure of Academic Progress testing. Students at Horizon Middle School completed fall MAP testing last September and winter MAP testing in December. MAP testing scores from this spring's testing, which will occur during May, will be compared with fall testing to measure students' academic growth.

Spring is a very "assessment rich" time in the school year. We ask you to support your children by talking to them about the assessments and encouraging your son or daughter to do their best. These assessments play a part in determining which classes your son or daughter will be placed in next school year so they are very important. Your continued support by providing an environment at home that allows students to receive proper nutrition and sleep, is essential to student learning and achievement. Thank you for the support you give your children in their education.

Pick-up and Drop-off

Please be cautious as you drop-off and / or pick- up your child(ren) from Horizon. The best place to drop students off or pick them up is still the curbside west-bound lane on 35th street or curbside north-bound lane on 11th avenue. People are also dropping off and picking up on the east side of Horizon. Please be mindful of students crossing any traffic lane as we want to all of our students to be safe.

Counselor's Comments

REGISTRATION NEWS:

6th Grade Students

In another effort to save paper, we will NOT be sending registration sheets home for students going from 6th to 7th grade. With that being said, current 6th grade students will have the same music class (band, orchestra, choir) for 7th grade as they had for 6th grade. 7th Grade Students

As 7th graders entering 8th grade, students have the opportunity to choose two periods of elective classes (up to four classes). In the past, we've sent home this paperwork and had to remind students over and over to return it to the Guidance Office. During the last week in February/first week in March, we will begin having the students request their elective classes during QT using Infinite Campus. Not only will we have 100% participation, but we will save time, paper, and frustration using this process.

Screen Time and Happiness:

Happiness is not a warm phone according to a new study that explored the new link between adolescent life satisfaction and screen time. The study was a nationally representative survey of more than a million 8th, 10th, and 12th graders. The survey asked students questions about how often they spent time on their phones, tablets, and computers as well as questions about their in-the-flesh social interactions and their overall happiness.

On average, the survey found that teens who spent more time in front of screen devices--playing computer games, using social media, texting, and video chatting were less happy than those who invested more time in non-screen activities like sports, reading newspapers and magazines, and face-to-face interactions.

Total screen abstinence doesn't lead to happiness either. The happiest teens used digital media a little less than an hour per day. After a daily hour of screen time, unhappiness rises steadily along with increasing screen time.



Clothing Policy

As the warmer days begin to descend upon us this spring, the amount of clothing worn by students tends to decrease proportionately. This often becomes a problem for some students as shorts are too short and tops are too revealing. The protocol listed in the Horizon Middle School Handbook for dealing with these issues will be followed. If your child wears clothing that is not appropriate for the school setting, we offer clothes for the student to wear or the student will be allowed to call home to bother you to bring them clothes that they are allowed to wear. In the past, parents having to come up to the school to bring appropriate clothes has been a real inconvenience due to parent's schedules, jobs, and other responsibilities. Please check with your son or daughter in advance about the clothing they need to wear at school in order to avoid needing to change. It is just a fact of life that some clothes that may be deemed appropriate for home are not acceptable for wearing at school.

Lost and Found

Notes from the Nurse



Medication reminder...

Prescription medication: The medication must be in the original container with a pharmacy label that includes the student name, medication, time and dose, date of prescription and the physician's name. Medication can only be given as instructed on the label.

Over the counter medication: The medication must be provided by the parent, in the original container and labeled with the student's name. Medication can only be given as directed on the bottle for age and dose. Any changes in the manufacturer's recommendation will require a written order from a physician.

Any medication not properly labeled or stored cannot be given at school. No medication will be accepted in baggies or unmarked containers. All medication is to be stored in the health office.

NO MEDICATION WILL BE GIVEN WITHOUT A SIGNED PARENT CONSENT FORM (available in the school office).

Medication Pick-Up:

Medication cannot be kept at school over the summer. Students with over-the-counter meds at school may pick them up anytime the last week of school. **Prescription medications MUST** be picked up by parents by the last day of school. **Unclaimed medications will be discarded after the last day of school.**

School physicals for 6th to 7th grade students

It is time for 6th grade parents to start thinking about 7th grade. All students entering 7th grade are to have a physical exam within 6 months before the start of the school year. 7th grade students are also required by law to have a **pertussis booster, (Tdap shot)**. You can start getting this done anytime. Please do not wait until later in the summer to schedule, as you may not get it done before the school year starts. **The health form will be sent home in March.** Parents are to sign the form, keep it until you go to the doctor and they complete the back of the form before turning it in to school. Forms need to be returned before the first day of school. Thank you for your cooperation in getting this done. If you have questions, please feel free to contact the school nurse.

MathCounts

The Horizon Middle School MathCounts team competed at the Mid-States Chapter competition on Thursday, February 14 at UNK. The competition hosted 25 teams of four students, as well as individual competitors. About 200 students attended this problem-solving math competition.

HMS was well represented. The Horizon team placed first. Team members were Karson Walters, Ethan Sundberg, Jacob Dimmitt and Emma Heacock. These students will compete at the state level on March 16 at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Students are awarded recognition for individual placement as well as team efforts. All ten of the HMS competitors placed in the top 100. Taking home trophies for individual efforts were Jacob Dimmitt as third overall and Karson Walters as sixth. Other placements were Ethan Sundberg, 14th; Alivia Olson, 17th; Sam Kreis, 24th; Dylan Wall, 28th; Emma Heacock, 35th; Luke Richmond, 49th; Kelsey Hatcher, 84th; and Emma Talbert, 90th.

Spanish I Elective

Dear Parent/Guardian -


Thank you for your interest in learning more about the Spanish I elective class offered to 8th graders. Spanish I is a full year academic class that would count toward the two year entrance requirement for a 4-year college. It is important to note that **no language requirement is needed to graduate from high school**. The Spanish I curriculum is the same at the middle schools and the high school. Please note that no high school credit can be earned in middle school. Students may need a higher level of academic maturity in order to be successful in Spanish I. Therefore, it may be beneficial for some students to take their World language courses at the high school to increase the opportunity for success.

Students will learn basic knowledge of the language through listening, speaking, reading, and writing. An integrated, hands-on curriculum is used to introduce vocabulary and sentence structure necessary in building beginning conversational skills. The course also emphasizes the study of Hispanic countries, customs and cultures.

Suggested prerequisites and skills for success:

- C or better in 7th grade Introduction class
- C or better in English and Reading courses
- Memorize and retain a large amount of vocabulary
- Comprehend many grammar concepts
- Complete several homework assignments per week
- Limited attendance issues
- Responsible work ethic
- Proficient time management

News from the Library



Golden Sower Readers

The Nebraska Golden Sower Award program was initiated by Karla Hawkins Wendelin and Dee Storey at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 1981. It is a children's choice award and winners are chosen in three categories annually: Picture Books (grades K-3), Chapter Books (grades 4-6) and Novels (grades 6-9).

Tens of thousands of Nebraska's students participate in the Golden Sower Award program each year. In order to qualify as a voter, students must read four of ten nominees in a category. Voting takes place in April and the winners are announced in May. At Horizon Middle School, students may read intermediate or young adult titles (and many students qualify to vote in either). As students and staff qualify as Golden Sower voters, their pictures are taken and posted in the library.

The vote for this year's Golden Sower Award will be **Friday, April 5th**. There will be a voting party during 10th Period on the 5th for those who qualify. Invitations will be sent out to all those who qualify the week before the party. At this point, many students just need to finish one or two books in order to qualify. Please encourage your students to finish reading their Golden Sower books this month so they don't miss out on the fun opportunity.

MakerSpace Mondays

Most of us feel like kids need more time to unplug and play these days, and research shows that students who spend time problem solving and creating develop the types of skills needed to be successful in their future endeavors. With these goals in mind, the Horizon Library has a MakerSpace for students to use.

This area includes a variety of games and materials for students to explore the areas of STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) before, during and after school. In addition to crafts and building materials, the space includes simple robotics, coding materials, circuits, building materials of all kinds, a 3D printer, as well as logic and problem solving games and activities. This year a new Carvey machine from Inventables was added with a grant from ClassAct!

Social Networking Tips

It's all about hanging with friends -- online.

Posts, status updates, comments, instant messages, video uploads, tweets, and texts have become a regular part of our kids' lives. In today's 24/7 digital world, kids are logging on from everywhere, including smartphones, gaming devices, tablets, and laptops, and many parents simply don't know what their kids are up to, much less much about the social media they're using.

The reality is that most kids start developing online relationships around the age of 8, usually through virtual worlds like [Club Penguin](#). By age 10, they've progressed to multiplayer games and sharing their digital creations and homemade videos on sites like [YouTube](#). By age 13, millions of kids have already created accounts on social networking sites like [Facebook](#).

There are many positives to social media. It's a fun way for kids to interact with friends. It can also be a great way to learn new things, collaborate with others, express creativity, and safely experiment with identity.

Why social networking matters

The problem comes when kids share their private thoughts, photos, videos, and personal information. These revealing posts can become very public and last a long time. A post of a provocative photo or a picture with a beer bottle in hand could end up damaging a kid's reputation.

Even more troubling are the privacy and safety issues that come with social networking. Marketers collect data based on your kids' online activity and then target ads to them. And now with the ability to easily post your location, physical safety becomes a concern.

While no one knows what effect increased social networking has on kids' development, it's clear that young people do need some guidance around use. So how can you help your kids make good decisions as they navigate their virtual lives?

Parent tips for young kids

- **Stick with age-appropriate sites.** For kids 5-8, there are [sites with strong safety features](#) that help kids play without risking inappropriate content or contact.

Parent tips for middle school kids

- **Facebook won't let kids have sites if they're under 13.** That said, kids simply do the math to figure out what year to put so they'll seem 13 -- or older. Check your kid's computer browser history. If you see Facebook listed, assume your kid has an account.
- **Tell your kids to think before they post.** Remind them that everything can be seen by a vast, invisible audience (otherwise known as friends of friends of friends). Each family is different, but for middle school kids, it's a good idea for parents to have access to their kids' pages, at least at first, to be sure that what's being posted is appropriate. Parents can help keep their children from doing something they'll regret later.
- **Make sure kids set their privacy settings.** Privacy settings aren't foolproof, but they're important. Take the time to learn how privacy settings work on your kids' favorite sites, and teach your kids how to control their privacy.
- **Kindness counts.** Lots of sites have anonymous applications like "bathroom wall" or "honesty boxes" that allow users to tell their friends what they think of them. Rule of thumb: If your children wouldn't say it to someone's face, they shouldn't post it.
- **Go online.** If you don't have one already, get an account for yourself. See what kids can and can't do.

Parent tips for high school kids

- **Talk about the nature of their digital world.** Remind them that anyone can see what's on their pages -- even if they think no one will. Potential employers and college admissions staff often surf social networking sites. Ask your teens to think about who might see their pages and how they might interpret the posts or photos.
- **Set some rules for what is and isn't appropriate for your kids to communicate, play, and post online.** Posts with photos or comments about youthful misbehavior could come back to haunt them.
- **Let them know that anything they create or communicate can be cut, altered, pasted, and sent around.** Once they put something on their pages, it's out of their control and can be taken out of context and used to hurt them or someone else. This includes talk and photos of sex, drugs, and alcohol. Tell them that online stuff can last forever. If they wouldn't put something on the wall of the school hallway, they shouldn't post it online.
- **Don't post your location.** Social networks allow kids to post their location -- but it's just not safe for teens to do this.
- **Watch the clock.** Social network sites can be real time suckers. Hours and hours can go by -- which isn't great for getting homework done.

Green Team

The Green Team had another great GREEN SCIENCE FAIR on February 5th! Activities included making paper out of recycled paper; making scarves and hair ties out of t-shirts; making bottlecap magnets; and making cell phone speakers out of toilet paper and paper towel tubes. Students had the chance to play golf with recycled wrapping paper tubes and cereal boxes and aimed paper airplanes at recycling bins.

There was an interactive display on renewable energy with kits showing how to make wind, solar, and water energy. There were also displays on composting worms (red wigglers), preventing ocean pollution, why to give up plastic bags, the 4 Rs (reduce, reuse, recycle + repurpose), how to pack a ZERO Waste lunch, and how the weight in metric tons has decreased over the past 4 years at the Kearney Landfill.

Finally, there was a green food table with apples, grapes, honeydew, kiwi, limes, and sugar snap peas. Prizes for the games and best displays were donated by Office Depot, Walmart, and the KPS Green Schools Initiative program.
